



Simulation in hospice and homecare: Are students ready for the challenge?

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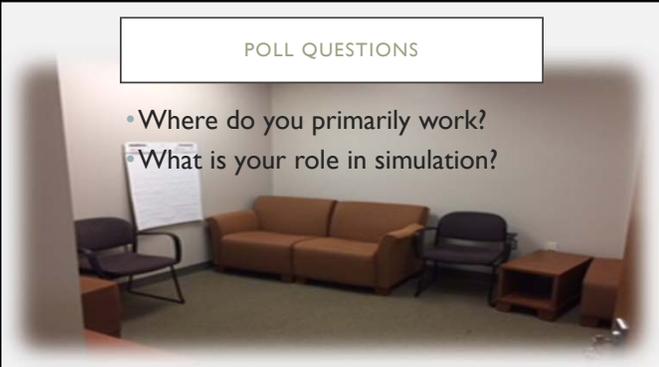
OBJECTIVES

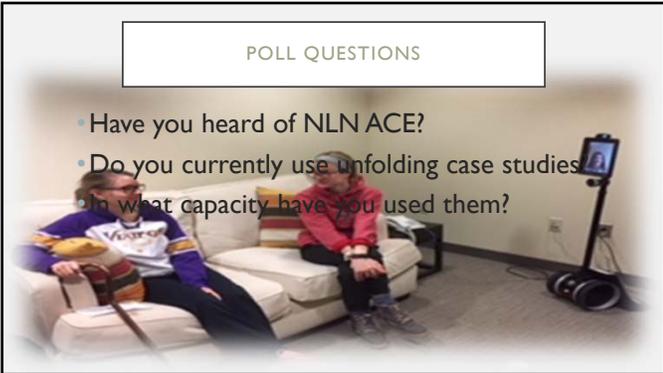

Example of a Simulation Schedule

WHAT IS THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN HOME AND HOSPITAL BASED NURSING?

- Students identified that in a home setting:
 - Care is more individualized, therapeutic, personal; can connect more easily
 - You are their guest and have more time to work 1:1
 - You need autonomy, flexibility, confidence, respect, and trust
 - Caution and preparation is needed
 - Support is not as readily available, it's over the phone
